The Keynote Speaker! Dr. Dawn Rundman

Dr. Dawn Rundman is a nationally recognized teacher, presenter, author, and resource provider specializing in children's faith development. She received her Ph.D. in Developmental Psychology from the University of Oregon. Since 2002 she's developed faith formation resources at Sparkhouse and Augsburg Fortress, two publishing units of 1517 Media. She was thrilled to release her newest book *Little Steps*, *Big Faith* on October 2, 2018.

Dawn speaks and leads workshops across the country at conferences and congregations. Her writing has appeared in *Children's Ministry Magazine*, *Youth Worker Journal*, and *Living Lutheran*, as well as blogs for Sparkhouse, Beaming Books, and MOPS. Dawn's first children's book was *Alphabet Adventure*, written especially for 3-year-olds. She has also authored two books in the Frolic series under the pseudonym Lucy Bell: *Uri and the Busy Day* and *Jo and the Not-So-Little Lie*.

The Bible Study Leader! Rev. Dr. Rolf Jacobson

The Rev. Dr. Rolf Jacobson is Professor of Old Testament and the Alvin N. Rogness Chair of Scripture, Theology, and Ministry at Luther Seminary Known for his humor and faithful biblical interpretation, Jacobson is an indemand preacher and teacher. With Craig Koester, he developed and supports the Narrative Lectionary. His many books include *The Homebrewed Christianity Guide to the Old Testament: Israel's In-Your-Face, Holy God.* His scholarly interests include the Psalms, prophets, biblical theology, biblical narrative, and preaching the Old Testament. His voice can be heard on two weekly preaching podcasts, "Sermon Brainwave" and "The Narrative Lectionary," as well as singing the high lonesome with a Lutheran bluegrass band, "The Fleshpots of Egypt." A survivor of childhood cancer, he is a double, above-the-knee amputee, who generally wears a bicycle and a smile. He lives in St. Paul, Minnesota, with his beloved wife Amy, their children Ingrid and Gunnar, and a cat who thinks he is a dog.




The Band! Led by George Donovan

No stranger to Power in the Spirit, **George Donovan** has returned to the Virginia Synod and will serve as our lead worship musician. ☐ A1 Committed to One Another: Congregations as Communities of Christian Care

As a teenager in a previous millennium, Professor Rolf Jacobson fought a battle with cancer. "Sort of the opposite of the 'young wolf" in 'A Game of Thrones,' I lost every battle but won the war. But I never fought alone, I had all of St John's Lutheran Church fighting with me." In this workshop, Jacobson will talk about how Christian congregations are communities of pastoral care--and will teach about how we are to take care of each other and show up in each others' suffering.
